President's Budget Proposal Threatens Key Affordable Housing Programs

The Trump Administration's FY 2026 budget blueprint proposes unprecedented cuts to federal housing and community development programs — slashing HUD's discretionary funding by more than 50%, from \$89 billion to \$43.5 billion. The proposal severely impacts or eliminates core programs such as the HOME Program, the Community Development Block Grants (CDBG), and rental assistance — including Housing Choice Vouchers and Project-Based Rental Assistance. The CDFI Fund would see its grant funding eliminated entirely, and rural housing programs under USDA would face similar rollbacks. The budget now moves to Congress, where appropriators will determine whether to adopt, reject, or revise the administration's proposal. Republican Appropriators Raise Concerns About Cuts to HUD Budget

HUD Secretary Scott Turner testified before the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Transportation, Housing and Urban Development on June 10 and 11. During his testimony, the Republican subcommittee chairs both voiced significant concern with HUD's request for 43.6% less funding in FY26 than it has for FY25. They also raised concerns about HUD's proposal to merge its five largest housing assistance programs into one block grant to states — with 42% less funding than the programs collectively have in FY25 — and with their requests to eliminate the HOME Program and the CDBG program, while also cutting its homeless assistance and fair housing programs.

Senators Warn Against Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac Privatization

The Trump administration is pushing to privatize Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, which support 70% of the U.S. mortgage market and have been in federal conservatorship since the 2008 financial crisis. Senate Democrats sent a letter to the Director of the Federal Housing Finance Agency expressing concern that privatization could prioritize investor profits over housing stability for millions of Americans. They also criticized the administration for failing to evaluate the impacts on mortgage rates and the broader housing market.

Community Builders Network (CBN) of Metro St. Louis hosted Alliance members for our Midwest Caucus on June 25–26.
